# Northwest Rural PPD Board Approves EV Purchase

After five months of consideration and deliberation from February to June of this year, the NRPPD Board of Directors approved the purchase of an electric vehicle. There were many, many questions from the Board to management and many factors considered by the Board prior to approval. Two of the main questions were how much "extra" it might cost and what benefits NRPPD would gain from such a purchase.

As to the first part of that discussion the Board insisted management provide detailed financial analysis of the upfront costs to acquire a vehicle but also the on-going costs associated with maintenance, electric consumption, and insurance. Currently the majority of meeting expenses associated with travel costs are reimbursed at the IRS mileage rate for use of personal vehicles. The consideration is whether replacement of personal mileage with costs of ownership from an EV is a net positive or negative effect. This determination mainly comes down to the value at the end of use which was assumed to be four years. If the vehicle is worth 50% of original price the net savings are approximately \$3,000 (below 40% valuation results in a net negative).

Since the majority of the Board was comfortable that a loss, if any, would be minimal, the Board voted to approve the purchase with one dissenting vote. Initially the Board was provided options from Ford, Tesla, Chevrolet, Chrysler, Hyundai and Honda. Ultimately the choice came down to the new Mustang Mach-e and a Tesla Model 3. For a variety of reasons including

charging network and vehicle history (or lack thereof related to the Mustang) the Tesla was selected. The vehicle has been ordered and is expected for delivery in October.

**UPON RECEIPT** of the vehicle NRPPD will begin to accumulate information to pass along for interested customers related to charging station availability, reliability or unforeseen maintenance issues, range reduction in cold weather, among other experiences of interest. In addition to company use and data acquisition, the vehicle will be available for those customers interested in driving an electric vehicle. When not being used the vehicle will be parked at the office and available for test drives (after signing a waiver and providing proof of a driver's license).

Many of you were able to participate in the Ride and Drive events during 2020 where NRPPD was granted access to a couple electric vehicles provided by our wholesale power supplier, Tri-State G&T. Those vehicles were a Chevy Bolt and a Tesla Model 3. There were over 200 customers and employees able to drive one of the electric vehicles. If you were unable during 2020 events, please keep in mind to drive the NRPPD vehicle when you are in the Hay Springs area.

If you are interested in purchasing an electric vehicle for your own use there are federal tax incentives up to \$7,500 available for most electric vehicles and NRPPD has a rebate available up to \$500 for installation of a home charging station. # NORTHWEST RURAL NEWS Is an Electric Vehicle Right For You?

## Is your daily commute under 330 miles?

Most of today's electric vehicles have a driving range-per-charge between 50 to 330 miles. If your daily commute is under 250 miles per day, there is likely an affordable EV model that will fit your needs.

**BUYER TIP:** When you're looking at EVs, be sure to check the "range-per-charge" for the vehicle. This is the number of miles the car can typically drive between full charges. For example, if the range per charge for an EV is 100 miles and your daily commute is 30 miles, you should be able to go about 3 days between charges (30mi + 30mi + 30mi = 90mi). EV range varies significantly between models.

## Do you frequently take long road trips?

Long road trips can present challenges for today's electric vehicles. Public charging infrastructure and battery technology is continually improving, but planning is still required for long trips. There are many EV models available with a range-per-charge of 150 to 250 miles. There are some high-end EVs that can get over 330 miles on a single charge.



## Does your household have more than one car?

If you live in a household with more than one car, an EV likely represents a big opportunity for your family to save a lot of money, while improving the quality of our environment. Use an EV for commuting and use the other vehicle for long distance drives... it's just that easy!

## Do you have off-street parking at your home?

Plugin electric vehicles require charging. Charging can be done with a standard 120V outlet or you can have a 240V charger installed in your garage or driveway. Known as "Level 2 EVSE equipment," 240V charging reduces charging time substantially, is more energy efficient and some



EVSE models allow you to schedule charging times, which may allow you to take advantage of special electric rates.

## Do you want to save money AND pollute less?



EVs cost less to drive and pollute less, period. An EV uses electricity that is typically generated from sources that are cleaner than burning gasoline or diesel in a vehicle.

# Along The Garden Path

#### September Garden -- We Are Not Done Yet

As September rolls around we often think of the garden as being done. The kids are in school. The flowers and planters probably look fine until the first frost and then they

are done. Not much work to do in that area. Let's move on to fall activities.

Truthfully, if you could just hang in there a little while longer with some gardening chores, next spring could be much easier. Look at it as a list of chores to make life easier.

• HARVESTING - Of course, we want to finish up the harvest. Pick the

last tomatoes and apples, pull the root crops - carrots, beets, potatoes and store them away. As you pick these last vegetables, clean the debris out of your garden. Bugs nest overwinter in the debris left in your garden so clean up the debris and throw it into your compost pile.

• **COMPOST PILE** - Before you put new compost in the pile use up any remaining compost in your bins to make room for the leaves and garden debris that you will soon add.

• **PLANT GARLIC** - Now is the time to plant a small patch of garlic for next year. Cover the area with straw to protect it. I usually put a pallet over the straw to keep it secure through the winter.

• Clean the debris and straighten up your perennial beds. Now is a good time to look over your perennial bed and consider whether you need to move some of the plants, buy some new plants next spring, and assess whether you like the overall appearance. Taking a picture of your flower beds now will help you remember what you want to do next spring before the plants are up. An example, I am planting some daffodils and tulips between some of my later blooming perennials for spring color.

• Move your tender houseplants indoors before the frost. Rinse your houseplants off and repot them into new con-

tainers as you bring them in. They will appreciate a little extra care at this time and reward you with new growth through the winter. The rinsing off will also eliminate any bugs that might want to winter over in your plants.

• Clean and restock your birdfeeders.

• Dig up and store tender bulbs and tubers, such as cannas and dahlias. You will enjoy them again next year.

• Pick the seed pods and heads of any open pollinated flowers you want to grow again next year. You can save the seeds from marigolds, zinnias, cosmos, and 4 o'clocks to mention a few.

• Protect tender plants - Get out your row covers and blankets, as well as protective cones for the roses, so you are ready for the cold weather that will be coming.

• Plant some fall color - Clean out a couple of planters or an area of your flower garden and plant pansies, mums and kale for later fall color.

• Green Tomatoes - If your tomato vines are covered with green fruit, pull up whole plants and hang them in a basement or garage until fruits ripen. OR - You can pick the green tomatoes and wrap them in newspaper. Place the wrapped tomatoes in a flat in a cool place and check periodically for ripening.

• Horseradish - You can dig and grind horseradish during any month with an R in the name. September is the first month for this activity so you might as well get it done before the snow falls.

• Cure your onions - After onion tops have fallen over, dig the bulbs and let them cure on the ground in a shaded spot or on your garage floor for about a week before you store them.

• Plant spring-blooming bulbs - If you want to force some bulbs for Easter or early plants in the house put them in the refrigerator now.

Now that list might look long but it won't take too long and will save you tons of time next spring.

## Creamy Tomato-Chicken Pasta

- 1 pound Chicken, broilers or fryers, thigh, meat only, raw
- 1 pinch chili powder, or to taste
- salt and ground black pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon olive oil, or as needed
- 5 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 (16 ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 (8 ounce) package fresh spinach
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh basil, or to taste
- 1 (16 ounce) package penne pasta

Pat chicken dry and season with chili powder, salt, and pepper.

Heat oil in a pan over medium-high heat. Sear chicken in the hot oil until browned, about 3 minutes per side. Remove to a clean plate.

Place garlic in the leftover juices in the pan and saute over medium heat until aromatic, 30 seconds to 1 minute. Stir in tomato sauce and heavy cream; reduce heat to low. Add spinach and basil and cook and stir until spinach wilts. Add chicken to the sauce and cook until chicken is no longer pink in the centers.

While chicken mixture cooks, bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add penne and cook, stirring occasionally, until tender yet firm to the bite, about 11 minutes. Drain.

Serve chicken mixture on top of pasta.

- 1 onion, chopped

- salt and pepper to taste
- · 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar

In a large bowl, combine the tomato, onion, cucumber, bell pepper, basil, parsley, garlic and vinegar. Toss and add salt and pepper to taste. Chill and serve.

## Apple Betty

- 4 cups thinly sliced apples

- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 pinch salt
- 1/2 cup butter

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Lightly grease a 9 inch pie plate.

Mound sliced apples in the pie plate. Sprinkle with orange juice.

In a medium bowl, mix the flour, sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, and salt. Cut in butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Scatter over the apples.

Bake in preheated oven for 45 minutes. Serve warm.
