

Montana Balloon Experiment Recalled 33 Years Later

An activity that was fairly common back in the 80s and is not recommended by power companies today jarred a memory of a rural Hemingford woman. About a month ago Ann Mapes received a letter from a Montana man asking her if she remembered finding a balloon in a fence line near Whitney with a note attached 33 years ago. The envelope included a copy of a letter Ann had sent in response to Fifth Grade Teacher Bruce Hall at Potomac School. which was located about 20 miles from Missoula, Mont.


Hall, now 69, was visiting his three grandchildren in Gillette, Wyo. about a month ago and he related the balloon activity he had done with his students and decided to try the same with his grandchildren to see if they would get a response.

After Hall returned back to Montana he decided to look in a box of his teaching memorabilia and found the letter the students received from Ann over three decades ago. So on a whim, Hall wondered if he would be able to contact Ann. "I had no idea if she would be

dead or alive," said Hall. After some research on the computer he was able to come up with an address although Ann and her husband Jim had moved out by Cottonwood School northwest of Hemingford.

He started with a letter to Ann followed up by a phone call a few days later. Ann really didn't remember writing the letter but recalls finding the balloon in a hog fence. The balloon was launched on Oct. 30, 1989 from Potomac, Mont. and she found it early the next morning near Whitney. That means the balloon travelled 770 miles in approximately 12 hours. Ann responded right away to the Fifth Graders and never gave it much thought after that.

Interestingly enough, Bruce Hall and his wife do have Nebraska ties. "She received her undergraduate degree from UNO, a native Cornhusker. I attended both the UNO and Lincoln campuses but finished my teaching degree in Montana in 1983. Hall was born in Indiana, spent a few years (Continued on Page 2)



in Kentucky then back to Indiana then Nebraska and now Montana. "Our family moved around when I was young due to my dad being transferred. I consider Montana home after four plus decades and raising a family here," said Hall. "I taught in Potomac for 11 years then left teaching and helped to establish a notfor-profit Community Benefit Corporation in Bonner, Mont. where my wife and I have lived for 44 years. I was engaged in community development for 25 years."

Hall noted, "Things that fly captivate a kids imagination. I taught an aviation unit every year that included rocket club, rubber band flight, egg drops from aircraft as well as the balloon launch. One year the class

took what was called a discovery flight in a Cessna 172, I awarded individual discovery flights to several students over the years as well."

On the other hand, Ann and Jim Mapes lived in the Whitney area where they rented a place and worked there, 20 miles northwest of Chadron, for about three years before they moved six miles west of Cottonwood School northwest of Hemingford.

They just retired a few years ago and are now 86 and 83 respectively. After being engaged in agriculture all of their lives with Jim dropping out of school to work at the age of 14, they have more than earned their time to kickback. In addition farming, Ann spent quite a bit of time at District 30 on Mirage Flats cooking and driving the school bus, in addition to doing upholstery work. Jim made appearances at District 30 and many other schools as Santa for about 25 years.

Today, they continue to live out in the country and don't travel so much, but love to dance. Anyone that is familiar with the Mapes know they hardly ever miss a dance. "We've danced in the dirt, rocks, mud and about anywhere," said Ann. She has enjoyed conversing back and forth with her new acquaintance, Bruce Hall.

Oddly enough, both Ann and Bruce each have two adult sons. The Mapes credit their sons, Jim and Pete, for making it possible to farm as long as they did. Son Jim formerly owned Henkens Implement in Chadron and assisted his parents guite often with equipment repairs. While, Pete, who lives in Hay Springs and works for Burlington Northern Sante Fe Railroad assists with additional help around the farm.

Hall's two sons include one (40) that is a CRNA nurse anesthetist in Gillette, Wyo. and has three children. Their youngest son (36) is a Captain for Horizon Air as a regional carrier for Alaska Air. Prior to his aviation career he worked as a wireline engineer in the oil fields in North Dakota, Wyoming and Alaskan Slope.

Easter Lily Care

How you grow an Easter lily depends on whether you're keeping it as a potted plant or want it in the garden. Houseplants should be kept by a window with bright, indirect light and protected from cold drafts and heat sources, including heaters, fireplaces, and appliances. If the pot is wrapped in decorative foil (as is common for the plants sold in the spring around Easter), either remove it or check often to make sure water isn't collecting under the pot and in the foil. Overwatering will kill a plant more often than underwatering.

Easter lily bulbs in the garden are typically much easier to care for than transplanted potted plants. The bulbs should be planted around 4 to 6 inches deep and spaced about a foot apart. Don't allow the soil around the bulbs to dry out, but also ensure that they have good drainage to prevent rot.

Once your Easter lilies grow tall, it's common for them to need staking to keep them upright. However, potted plants often don't reach their maximum size potential, so they might not need staking. Remove flowers once they fade and wither. And cut the whole stem down to the soil once the plant is done flowering and the stem and leaves have yellowed.

Light

Easter lilies prefer to grow in full sun to partial shade. Protection from strong afternoon sun is often necessary, as light that's too bright can scorch the foliage. If possible, position your Easter lily so its top portion is in full sun but the area toward the soil is in shade, as the plant likes its roots to remain cool. Some shorter plants around the lily or a layer of mulch over its roots can help to achieve this.

Soil

These flowers like a well-drained soil that's rich in organic matter, though they can grow in a variety of soil types as long as the drainage is good. They prefer a slightly acidic to neutral soil pH, but they can tolerate slightly alkaline soil as well.

Water

Easter lilies like even soil moisture. So water whenever the top inch of soil dries out. Never allow the plants to sit in water, but also don't permit the soil to dry out completely. It's ideal to water in the morning, so the foliage has time to dry in the sun. Otherwise the plant might have problems with mildew.

Temperature and Humidity

Easter lilies grow and flower best in mild temperatures between 60 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit with nighttime temperatures dipping down to 55 to 60 degrees. They like an average humidity level and tend not to do well in very hot, humid climates.

Fertilizer

Use a slow-release, bal-anced fertilizer in the spring once new growth appears. If you don't have rich soil, it can be beneficial to do



another fertilizer application in the summer.

Varieties of Easter Lily

There are several varieties of the Easter lily:

- L. longiflorum 'White Heaven' is a classic pure white Easter lily that grows 2 to 3 feet high with 7-inch-long flowers.
- L. longiflorum 'Nellie White' is the cultivar normally grown and sold by commercial growers for the Easter lily trade.
- L. longiflorum 'Deliana' is a variety with creamy yellow flowers.
- L. longiflorum 'Elegant Lady' features fragrant pink flowers and is sometimes known as the pink Easter lily.
- L. langiflorum 'Trimphator' has white flowers with rosy pink centers.

Common Pests/Diseases

The Easter lily is susceptible to some pests or diseases. Occasionally a plant might have an aphid infestation, which can cause degraded foliage. Bring the infestation under control by hosing off the aphids with strong water blasts or by using insecticidal soap. Moreover, the plants are susceptible to the lily mosaic virus, which is spread via aphids and causes leaf discoloration and degradation. There is no cure for this disease, so affected plants must be dug up and destroyed before it spreads. There are also several types of bulb rot that can affect Easter lilies, along with botrytis blight and leaf scorch, and stem rot. To prevent these conditions, check your Easter lilies daily and perform remediations immediately.

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The Best Lemon Bars

- 1 cup butter, softened
- ½ cup white sugar
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 4 eggs
- 1 ½ cups white sugar
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 lemons, juiced

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In a medium bowl, blend together softened butter, 2 cups flour and 1/2 cup sugar. Press into the bottom of an ungreased 9x13 inch pan.

Bake for 15 to 20 minutes in the preheated oven, or until firm and golden. In another bowl, whisk together the remaining 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/4 cup flour. Whisk in the eggs and lemon juice. Pour over the baked crust.

Bake for an additional 20 minutes in the preheated oven. The bars will firm up as they cool. For a festive tray, make another pan using limes instead of lemons and adding a drop of green food coloring to give a very pale green. After both pans have cooled, cut into uniform 2 inch squares and arrange in a checker board fashion.

Easter Nest Cupcakes

- 1 (15.25 ounce) package chocolate cake mix
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 3 eggs
- 1 (10 oz.) package sweetened flaked coconut
- 1 (16 oz.) can prepared chocolate frosting
- 1 cup egg-shaped chocolate candies (such as peanut

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Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line 24 cupcake cups with paper liners.

Beat cake mix, water, vegetable oil, and eggs in a mixing bowl using an electric mixer, on low speed until mixture is moistened, 30 seconds. Increase speed to medium and beat until batter is smooth. 2 more minutes. Fill prepared cupcake cups about 2/3 full with batter.

Bake cupcakes in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into a cupcake comes out clean, 18 to 23 minutes. Remove cupcakes from oven and turn oven heat up to 400 degrees F. Let cupcakes cool.

Spread coconut into a large, shallow baking pan or onto a baking sheet; toast in the hot oven until coconut is golden brown, about 7 minutes. Cool.

Cut a piece out of the top of each cupcake to leave a hollow depression about 1/2 inch deep and 1 1/2 inches across. Discard cut-out portions. Frost cupcakes with chocolate frosting and cover frosting with toasted coconut. Place 3 egg-shaped candies in the small depression on top of each cupcake.

Easter Ham Glaze

- 1 cup water
- 1/3 cup honey
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground mustard
- 1 tablespoon granulated garlic
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

Combine water, honey, brown sugar, mustard, garlic, onion powder, cloves, and ginger in a saucepan. Mix to combine.

Warm saucepan over low heat until sugar and honey are melted together and sugar is dissolved.

Cook's Note: You can use your microwave to dissolve the brown sugar and honey.

Spring Forward With Outdoor Safety Tips

With the arrival of spring, there are some specific things to look out for regarding electric safety. Remember, you can't see, smell or hear electricity, so it's very important to take these precautions seriously.

Call before you dig

Spring is prime time for landscaping projects and "honey do" lists around the home. Remember to contact Iowa One Call at least two business days before you dig to any depth so underground utilities can be properly located. It's the law, and it could just save your life! Buried utility lines are everywhere, and an underground utility line is damaged every six minutes in the U.S. because someone decided to dig without calling 811 first.

Put safety first in the field

As you head into the fields to plant, always make sure to keep a 10-foot clearance between your equipment and power lines. Take time to study where all overhead power lines, poles and guy wires are located on your property and inform your workers about them. Plan your route between fields and on public roads so that you avoid low-hanging power lines; never attempt to raise or move a power line to clear a path. When moving large equipment or high loads near a power line, always use a spotter to help make sure that contact is not made with a line.

If equipment comes into contact with a power line, assume the line is energized and deadly. The operator should NOT get off the machinery unless in immediate danger. If the operator touches the ground and the equipment at the same time, he or she will become a channel for electricity. Instead, the operator should stay on the equipment and contact the local electric utility or 911 immediately to report the incident so electricity can be shut off safely before exiting.

When thunder roars, go indoors

Spring storms will be here soon, so remember that there is no safe place from lightning when you're outside. It's important to be aware of weather forecasts and watch for developing thunderstorms as lightning can strike many miles ahead of a storm front. If you hear thunder, seek shelter immediately because it indicates lightning is within 10 miles of you. Safe shelters include inside a building or in an enclosed metal-topped vehicle. Authorities warn against outdoor activity until 30 minutes after the last clap of thunder is heard.

Stay away from downed power lines

Spring and summer weather can bring storms and lead to downed power lines. Assume any wire lying on the ground is carrying electricity and stay away from it. If you spot a downed wire, immediately call your local police and your electric co-op. Keep others from getting near the downed wire until help arrives. Never attempt to drive over a downed power line.

Move over or slow down on the road

We need your help in keeping our line workers, engineers and maintenance workers safe on Iowa's roadways. If you see any vehicle stopped on the side of the road with flashing lights activated, you are required by law to move over or slow down, preferably both. Please give our employees room on the road; their jobs are hazardous enough already.




