She relaunched her business the first of February under a new name, Brass Ivy Antiques & Vintage.

Kodi believes she got the "junkin' bug" after refinishing a storage bench for a 4-H project in Junior High.

"I have bought and sold vintage and antique items as a hobby for 18 plus years," noted Kodi, who does remember the first big item she sold, but the most impressive item was selling a fabulous pair of vintage motorcycle saddle bags to Mike and Frank of American Pickers. They contacted her after a Facebook post.

"I mostly sell items from my Facebook page but I'm also blessed to have two little buildings at my folks place! One of them is a horse barn that my Dad and I fixed up and the other is a building that my dad built from scratch and we finished the inside with reclaimed wood and tin!" explained Kodi. She now hosts a couple of live sales a month on her "Brass Ivy Antiques & Vintage" FB page where followers hurry to get the most current cool pieces she is offering. Remember Electrical Safety During Spring Planting

As you prepare for planting season, don't forget to plan for safety. There are many aspects to safety on the farm, but electrical safety is often overlooked. Keep these safety tips in mind as you prepare for planting.

TRAIN OTHERS

Train anyone working on your farm, including family members and seasonal workers, about electrical hazards.

SAFETY FIRST

Have daily meetings to review the day's work and



Carrot Cake

- · 2 cups white sugar
- 1 ¼ cups vegetable oil
- 4 large eggs
- · 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- · 2 cups all-purpose flour
- · 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- ¹/₂ teaspoon salt
- 3 cups grated carrots
- 1 cup chopped pecans (Optional)

Frosting:

- ¹/₂ cup butter, softened
- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 4 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup chopped pecans (Optional)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour a 9x13-inch pan.

Beat sugar, oil, eggs, and 2 teaspoons vanilla together in a large bowl with an electric mixer until well combined.

Mix in flour, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt. Stir in carrots, then fold in pecans.

Pour into the prepared pan.

Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean, about 40 minutes. Let cool in the pan for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack and cool completely.

To make the frosting: Beat butter, cream cheese, confectioners' sugar, and 1 teaspoon vanilla together in a large bowl with an electric mixer until smooth and creamy.

Stir in chopped pecans.

Frost the cooled cake. Serve and enjoy!

discuss safety implications. Know and review where the power lines are, the clearance required, and the proper position of extensions as they are transported. WAIT TO UNFOLD

Remind workers to fold or unfold extensions well into the field, not close to the field's edge where power lines are typically located.

USE A SPOTTER

When working in the vicinity of power lines, always have a spotter on the ground, who can direct you away from power lines or poles if you are getting too close.

DO NOT EXIT YOUR CAB

If your machine or truck makes contact with a power line, pole, or guy wire, you could become electricity's path to ground and become electrocuted if you step out of the cab. Stay in the vehicle.

CALL 911

Call 911 to have your electric utility dispatched to deenergize the power source. Only exit the cab if your equipment is on fire. If that happens make a solid jump out, and hop away with feet together, as far as you can.

Spring Energy Savings

1. Service your air conditioner

Calling in a licensed HVAC professional for a checkup in the spring could help you avoid larger issues with your air conditioner in the warmer months of summer. They can check for any leaks that reduce the efficiency of your system, as well as offer any HVAC tips for spring that can ensure your system continues to function properly.

You can also perform some basic maintenance on your AC unit yourself, such as routinely replacing and cleaning air filters. These simple tasks could help lower your cooling system's energy consumption by up to 15%, resulting in a more energyefficient home.

2. Open windows

On warmer spring days, you can open windows to create a crosswise breeze, allowing you to naturally cool your home without adjusting the air conditioner settings. Plus, the fresh air from open windows can feel refreshing!

3. Use ceiling fans

The cost of running a ceiling fan to cool your home is significantly lower than turning on your AC unit. The U.S. Department of Energy says that cooling your home with ceiling fans will let you increase your thermostat four degrees, which could reduce your energy bill up to 30%. Using ceiling fans is a simple way to save money on your electricity bill without sacrificing your comfort.

4. Cook outside

When the spring temperature is a little higher, using an outdoor grill instead of an indoor oven can keep heat out of (Continued on Page 4)

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your house, which can quicky heat up the whole house. Grilling is a great excuse to enjoy the warm weather while conserving energy at the same time.

5. Update your windows

Direct sunlight in the spring can quickly warm up your home and make you want to turn on the air conditioning. Consider replacing your windowpanes with ENERGY STAR qualified windows that will prevent unwanted heat coming into your home. You may also consider window treatments, such as curtains, blinds, and shades, to help reduce heat gain when temperatures rise.

6. Caulk air leaks

If your home isn't air-tight, you may be losing more energy than you think. Cracks around windows and doors can let hot air in and cold air out. Sealing these air leaks can save you anywhere from 10 to 20% each year in energy costs.

7. Let sunlight in

Switch off artificial lights during daylight hours and take advantage of the natural light from windows to brighten your home. Traditional incandescent lightbulbs only use 10% of the electricity they consume for light; the rest turns into heat, unnecessarily warming your home.

8. Program the thermostat

With the fluctuating temperatures in spring, you may find yourself adjusting the thermostat constantly. Instead, set the temperature based on the time of day and whether anyone is at home.

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
