Rural Family Follows Dream of Owning Bar-Grill

When you get the chance to follow a dream, take the leap. "It has been a dream of myself and daughter Sarah Keiser's to own a Bar and Grill and the opportunity arose so we decided to chase the dream," said Tawnie Eichenberger of rural Clinton. The two along with Tawnie's husband, Tom, took ownership of the former Yoba's Bar & Grill in Rushville in October of last year. Yoba's was owned by Steve and Carol Elwood for 35 years before retiring.

The Eichenbergers are now operating under the name of The Bunkhouse

Bar & Grill, a new adventure for all of them, who have never worked in this line of business. The closest they come is with Tawnie working as the food service manager for Gordon-Rushville High School. Sarah, a mother of two daughters and a son, was employed at Stockman's Drug in Gordon.

"We are enjoying being around the public and seeing familiar faces that we typically wouldn't see being on the Ranch," said Tawnie.

"We have gotten to know our customer base quickly and easily. In a Small town, People get to know you and

know your food is good and will come back and give feedback so we can grow and stay in business. They give so much support, which is amazing," added Tawnie.

The Bunkhouse focuses on having a "very home feeling atmosphere and we are family oriented. Families are welcome with children of all ages".

They have a Simple American style menu which includes appetizers, burgers, steaks, complete with senior's and kid's menus. They have different daily specials Monday through Friday that they post on their facebook page. Examples include cabbage burgers, chicken alfredo, a

variety of different wraps and salads, hot hamburger with mashed potatoes and gravy, and Indian tacos.

"We also have a prime rib dinner special EVERY Saturday night from 5:30 to 9 p.m." said Tawnie. They began offering Breakfast three mornings a week from 6 to 10 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The Bunkhouse offers a salad bar Monday thru Friday during lunch and also Saturday evening. Some type of desert is typically available, often it is homemade pie. "The local

favorites are apple, pecan and keylime," noted Sarah.

The Bunkhouse now employs three bartenders and three cooks. Tawnie prefers to cook but waitresses often. On the other hand, Sarah, prefers to wait but also enjoys cooking. Tom tends to fill in wherever he is needed.

The Bunkhouse is open Monday thru Saturday 10 a.m. to close (grill closes at 9 p.m., and Sunday from 11 a.m. to noon. They welcome carry-outs and do catering. For large groups over six, they suggest reservations by calling 308-327-2097.

Evening entertainment is often available including Karaoke Night, and has had some live music including B.J. Jamison Music. They already have booked the band "Whiskey River" from Omaha lined up for Fun Days, Labor Day Weekend on Saturday, Sept. 2.

Other activities have included Cribbage Tournaments in which they are hoping to continue the third Saturday of each month.

Sarah has given the establishment a community touch and invites ranchers and farmers to have their names and brands displayed on boards on the entrance wall. "They can either take the boards home and brand them themselves or I can hand draw their

Low Country Boil

- 1 tablespoon seafood seasoning (such as Old Bay®), or to
- 5 lbs. new potatoes
- 3 (16 oz) packages cooked kielbasa sausage, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 8 ears fresh corn, husks and silks removed
- 5 lbs. whole crab, broken into pieces
- 4 lbs. fresh shrimp, peeled and deveined

Heat a large pot of water over an outdoor cooker, or on the stovetop over medium-high heat. Add seafood seasoning to taste and bring to a boil.

Add potatoes and sausage and cook for 10 minutes. Break corn ears in half; add corn and crab and cook for another 5 minutes.

Add shrimp when potatoes are almost tender and everything else is almost done; cook until shrimp are just cooked through, 3 to 4 minutes longer.

Drain off and discard the water. Pour the contents out onto a picnic table covered with newspaper.

Strawberry Pie

- 1 quart fresh strawberries, hulled
- 1 (9 inch) pie crust, baked
- 1 cup white sugar
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- ¾ cup water
- ½ cup heavy whipping cream

Arrange half of strawberries in baked pastry shell. Place remaining strawberries in a medium saucepan.

Add sugar to the strawberries in the saucepan; place over

medium heat and bring to a boil, stirring frequently.

Whisk cornstarch and water together in a small bowl. Gradually stir cornstarch mixture into boiling strawberry mixture. Reduce heat and simmer mixture until thickened, about 10 minutes, stirring constantly.

Pour cooked strawberry mixture over berries in pastry shell. Refrigerate until chilled and set, at least 3 hours.

Before serving, whip cream in a medium bowl until soft peaks form. Serve each slice of pie with a dollop of whipped

- ½ cup milk chocolate chips, or more to taste
- 12 ice cream cones
- ½ cup miniature marshmallows, or more to taste
- 12 12x12-inch squares of heavy-duty aluminum foil

Place about 1 teaspoon chocolate chips into an ice cream cone, followed by a layer of mini marshmallows. Continue layering chips and marshmallows in cone until full. Wrap each cone tightly in aluminum foil. Repeat this step with remaining chocolate chips, cones, marshmallows, and foil.

Heat cones in a campfire until chocolate and marshmallows are melted, 3 to 5 minutes.

Sweet Restaurant Slaw

- 1 (16 ounce) bag coleslaw mix
- 2 tablespoons diced onion
- 2/3 cup creamy salad dressing (such as Miracle Whip™)
- ½ cup white sugar
- 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- ½ teaspoon poppy seeds
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Combine coleslaw mix and onion in a large bowl.

Whisk salad dressing, sugar, vegetable oil, vinegar, poppy seeds, and salt together in a medium bowl until blended. Pour dressing over coleslaw mixture and toss to coat.

Chill for at least 2 hours before serving.


