Dawes Co. Rancher Invests in Custom Services

About the time Tim McClaren, of Sand Canyon Ranch, made the decision to disperse his cattle he came across the perfect business opportunity. "Ken Janssen from the Gordon area was needing to slow down due to health reasons in 2021. He had started Janssen Hay Grinding and built up quite an established clientele over many years," said McClaren. It seemed like the perfect match, it was flexible and he could continue his ranch work. He and his wife Lori decided to invest in this new adventure. Lori just recently retired from NCAP-Head Start this past May after 30 years. She does the T&L book work portion .

Tim graduated from Custer, S.D. high school in 1983. His family ranched near Pringle, S.D. and in 2004, his Dad and brothers decided to buy a ranch together in southeastern Dawes County, the former Pepper Creek Ranch. He met his future wife, Lori (Gering) Heiting the following year and they were married in 2010. They built a new home on the property in 2009.

McClaren's current hired man, Brad Lipps, previously worked at the sale barn in Rushville,

began in 2021 and assists with the grinding business and has since joined in an another business venture. Lipps is a native of Hay Springs graduating in 2007 and has a five-year-old daughter, Everleigh.

Why grind your hay? Grinding eliminates a lot of waste. The truck-mounted grinding tub is filled with round bales of corn stalks, grass hay, alfalfa, millet.... or any small

grain. The big bales revolve in the tub as they're shred apart and sent out on a conveyor system into a pile of feed. Grinding hay and forage more finely can keep cattle from picking through their food. Grinding lower quality forages is a way to make the feed more palatable to cattle. It's a typical part of winter feeding, and provides another option during drought when pastures aren't available for grazing and hay

quality degrades.

T&L Grinding recently upgraded their grinder, which previously was a HayBuster 530 for more horse power, a HayBuster 640 hp.

T&L has customers in South Dakota including Martin, Batesland, Long Valley, Pine Ridge; then in Nebraska from Cody to Alliance. "We would be more than happy to travel further to assist ranchers," (Continued on Page 2)

said McClaren. One of his regular customers is a feedlot east of Alliance near Antioch, Strategy Feeders. However, about 80 percent of their customers are ranchers feeding their own livestock.

The customer provides a tractor on site to feed the grinder. "Either the farmer can operate the tractor or we can," explained McClaren. The service is charged by the hour with mileage built in that fee. The grinder is actually operated by a remote control, typically from inside the truck. Wetter hay is a little harder to grind, it depends on the quality and moisture content. Most hay is ground within seconds. The demand for the grinder is always higher during the winter months.

In addition to the grinding business, McClaren, Lipps and Tim's nephew Chris McClaren have

expanded with a second business, "McLipps Custom Harvesting", adding chopping to their service. Ranchers often mix the ground hay with silage in a feed wagon for an even more desirable feed product. Chris relocated to the area from North Dakota in 2019 with his wife Amanda. In addition to ranching, Chris is an accomplished mechanic. The couple have a daughter, Aharis, a freshman at Hemingford High School.

The McClarens are currently downsizing and have their ranch for sale with plans of relocating closer to Hay Springs. The move will let them continue to do custom services like the grinding, chopping and having.

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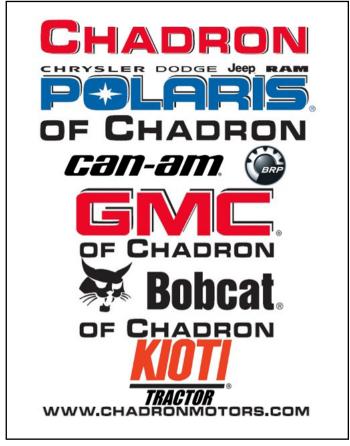

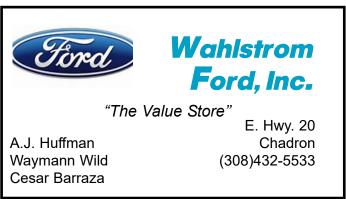

Five Tips for Electrical Safety at Home

Many electrical fires can be prevented by following some simple electricity safety tips. In our home electrical safety checklist below, there are 10 precautions every homeowner should know and follow. Always remember to ask a professional if you're uncertain about the safety of an electrical outlet or appliance.

1. Keep electrical devices and outlets away from water to prevent shock.

Water and electricity don't mix well. To follow electrical safety rules, keep electrical equipment dry and away from water pre-



vents damage to appliances and can protect against personal injury and electrocution. When working with electrical appliances, it's important to have dry hands. Keeping electrical equipment away from plant pots, aquariums, sinks, showers and bathtubs lowers the risk of water and electricity coming into contact.

2. Give your appliances proper space for air circulation to avoid overheating.

Without proper air circulation, electrical equipment can overheat and short out, and can become an electrical fire hazard. Make sure your appliances have proper air circulation, and avoid running electrical equipment in enclosed cabinets. For best electrical safety, it's also important to store flammable objects well away from all appliances and electronics. Pay especially close attention to your gas or electric dryer, as these need to be situated at least a foot from the wall to function safely.

3. Ensure that all your exhaust fans are clean to prevent fire hazards.

Some appliances have exhaust fans, which can get dirty or

clogged with debris and make the appliance work harder. This can shorten the life of the appliance and can cause a risk to the home due to overheating, or even cause a buildup of dangerous gasses that can lead to an electrical fire hazard. Cleaning exhaust fans regularly helps prevent such hazards.

9. Check that you're using the correct wattage in all your fixtures and appliances.

Using the right bulbs can prevent electrical problems, so check all lamps, fixtures and appliances to ensure you're using the correct wattage. If a light fixture has no wattage listed, use 60-watt bulbs or less. For unmarked ceiling fixtures, choose 25-watt bulbs.

Pro tip: LED bulbs consume less power and reduce the risk of fixtures overheating. Learn more about LED light benefits.

10. Be aware of heaters and water heaters to prevent potential accidents.

Combustible items should be kept away from portable heaters and built-in furnaces. For furnace safety, store combustibles far away from any heating appliances. Portable heaters should not be operated close to drapes, and to prevent tipping, they should only ever be placed on a stable surface.

On a related note, do you know what temperature your water heater is set to? High temperature settings eat into your water heater energy usage and can cause burns and unintentional scalding, especially in homes with small children.

Stacked Tomato & Burrata Salad

- 1 vine-ripened tomato, cored and cut into 1/2-inch slices
- · flaked sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup Burrata cheese, or more to taste
- 1 tablespoon torn fresh basil leaves, or to taste
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil



Place a tomato slice onto a plate and season with sea salt and black pepper. Spread Burrata cheese over tomato slice, top with torn basil leaves, and drizzle with olive oil. Repeat the layering process with remaining ingredients, finishing with a tomato slice.

Strawberry Pretzel Salad

- · 2 cups crushed pretzels
- 3/4 cup butter, melted
- 3 tablespoons white sugar
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 (8 ounce) container frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 2 (3 ounce) packages strawberry flavored Jell-O
- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 (10 ounce) packages frozen strawberries

Gather all ingredients and preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.

Stir crushed pretzels, melted butter, and 3 tablespoons sugar together until well-combined; mix well and press mixture into the bottom of a 9x13-inch baking dish.

Bake in the preheated oven until set, about 8 to 10 minutes: set aside to cool.

Place cream cheese and 1 cup sugar in a large bowl. Beat with an electric mixer until smooth; fold in whipped topping. Spread mixture onto cooled crust.

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in still-frozen strawberries and allow to set briefly. Pour and spread over cream cheese layer; refrigerate until set, at least 2 hours.

Serve and enjoy!

Filipino-Style Barbecue Chicken

- 1 medium very ripe banana, mashed
- 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
- · 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons freshly grated ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt, or to taste
- 1/8 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/8 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1/4 cup water

For the Chicken and Marinade:

- ½ cup prepared banana ketchup
- ¾ cup lemon-lime soda (such as 7-Up®)
- ½ cup soy sauce
- · 4 cloves crushed garlic
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 medium lemon, juiced
- 2 ½ pounds skinless, boneless chicken thighs, cut in half

For the Basting Sauce:

- 3 tablespoons reserved banana ketchup
- 3 tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon fish sauce

Mash ripe banana, tomato paste, vinegar, brown sugar, oil, ginger, onion powder, garlic powder, cayenne, salt, allspice, and turmeric together in a saucepan. Add water and stir to combine.

Place over medium-high heat and bring to a simmer. Stir to combine. Reduce heat to medium and simmer until reduced and thickened, 7 to 10 minutes. Remove from heat; reserve 3 tablespoons for the basting sauce, leaving about 1/2 cup for the marinade.

Transfer ½ cup banana ketchup to a bowl and add lemonlime soda, soy sauce, garlic, brown sugar, black pepper, and lemon juice for the marinade. Whisk until combined.

Add halved chicken thighs to marinade and toss to coat. Cover with plastic wrap and marinate in the refrigerator for 4 to 18 hours.

When you are ready to cook the chicken, combine reserved 3 tablespoons banana ketchup, soy sauce, brown sugar, oil, and fish sauce in a small bowl for basting sauce. Preheat a charcoal grill until coals are very hot.

Remove chicken from the refrigerator and place on metal skewers, folding in half with the smooth side on the outside, the rougher side folded in.

Grill chicken over hot coals until no longer pink in the centers, 15 to 20 minutes, turning and basting every 2 to 3 min-

Serve with accumulated juices or extra basting sauce.

I knew a place called Yesterday Where once I used to live. Nobody there would turn away Their time, they'd always give.

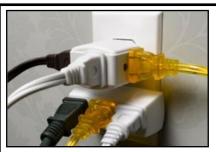
Everyone looked out for you As you did the same for them. In that place called Yesterday I can still remember when.
